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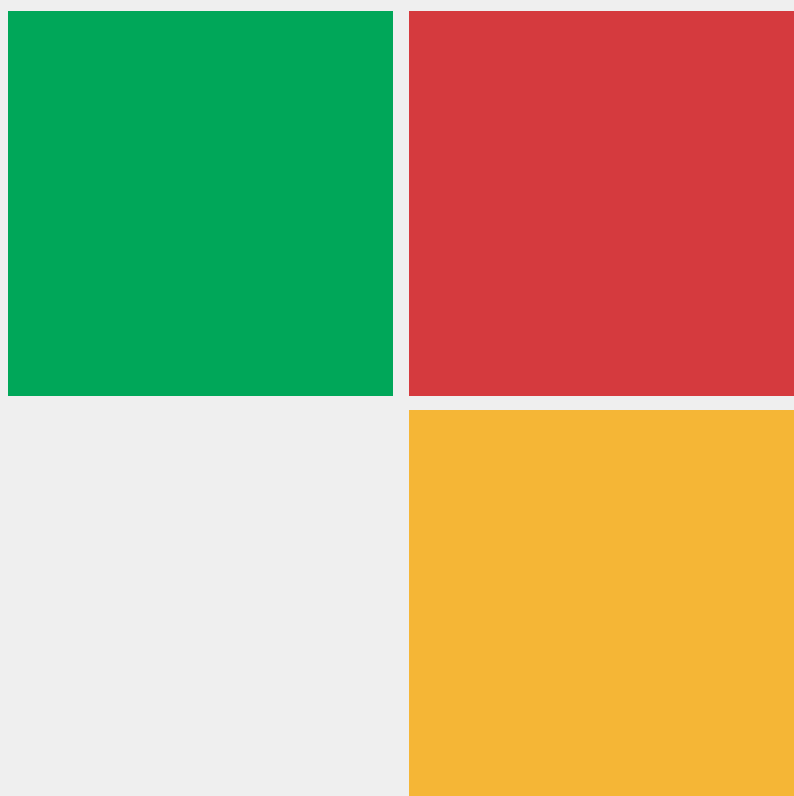
# Patron and Emeritus Chair

# CFNS Strategy

## Introduction

The Coalition in its second decade is a platform for members to collaborate and achieve the common vision of “sustainable food and nutrition security for all.” Unique and unparalleled, the Coalition has elected a Governing Board which includes senior functionaries from the Government of India, State governments and eminent civil society leaders.

The Coalition has the inherent strength as a public interest-oriented organisation to transform the food and nutrition landscape. This strategy aims to transform the country’s nutrition scenario through collective action, keeping sustainability as the key approach, placing women and girls in the forefront. The methodology involves a series of consultations, in- depth interviews, feedback from the thought leaders and practitioners from across India and the world, discussion and approval in the General Body.

The Coalition functions as a knowledge aggregator, collating existing research coupled with on-field programs, and transferring the knowledge to partners and stakeholders. The Coalition strategy involves collaboration, influencing policy for improving state accountability vis-a-vis SDG targets, and providing informed choices on policy reforms, breakthrough research, and strategic priorities in its pursuit of evidence-based advocacy.

These have been achieved by sustained and inclusive membership engagement, knowledge management designed for advocacy and to catalyse social behaviour change.



Our strategy for the next 5 years will be to ensure that sustainable food and nutrition is a priority agenda not only for the government, civil society and other development actors, but also for the socially responsible businesses, media, aid agencies and citizens at large, particularly the women and girls. Guided by the belief that women play a strategic role in protecting food and nutrition sovereignty, we will work to empower women with research backed information, tools and methods to bring changes in their human conditions and social positions. The Coalition will be guided by the concern that even as the increasing food demand is met, the natural resources will be used responsibly.

# Policy Dialogue: State Roundtables in 4 Project States

## Odisha State Roundtable

With almost one-fifth of Odisha's children under 5 years of age being wasted and the pandemic compounding the situation, the SAM children struggle to survive and thrive. Over the years, Odisha has made marginal progress in reduction of wasting. According to NFHS-4 (2015-16), the percentage of children with wasting was at 20.4% and this has marginally reduced to 18.1% as per most recent NFHS-5 (2020-21). Similarly, there is a marginal decrease in severe wasting in children, from 6.4% to 6.1% between NFHS-4 and NFHS-5. Odisha's wasted children and specifically children with severe wasting need the nourishment of good governance and good policy. CFNS in partnership with CYSD and Odisha CSR Forum organised a State Roundtable on May 11, 2023, on the theme "Addressing Perpetual Childhood Wasting in Odisha". The consultation was attended by senior policy makers, political leaders, thought leaders, champions and influential voices of the country and abroad. Recommendations that emerged from the discussions have been shared with the Commissioner cum Secretary Department of Women and Child Development, Odisha.

## ACTIVITIES



## Assam State Roundtable

Between 2015-16 to 2019-21 (NFHS-4 to NFHS-5), anaemia among children aged 6-59 months increased from 35.7% to 68.4% In Assam. A similar steep rise from 46% to 65.9% has been recorded among women, making this a worrying trend. This points at poor dietary practices and the lack of availability of nutritionally rich diets to adolescent girls and women, pointing at a disparity in the quality of food available to the female gender. Government of Assam initiatives such as the Janani Shishu Suraksha Karyakram, Swadhar Greh, SAKHI one-stop centre, Ujjawala and empowerment of women through Mission Purna Shakti are model initiatives that can be harnessed to bring better nutrition outcomes in the community. Empowering and educating women on the effects of climate change on nutrition levels of food, on the need for women-led nutrition-sensitive and climate-smart agriculture and strengthening the role of women's self-help groups and smallholder women farmers is critical and can be part of the movement towards achieving nutrition security. At the village level, Village Health Nutrition and Sanitation Day (VHSND) and in Sector, Block and District level convergence platforms, local micronutrient-rich foods can be promoted. Frontline workers, CHO and caregivers could be sensitized to the promotion of safe and nutritious diets in the Community Management of Acute Malnutrition (CMAM) program.

To lend momentum to this important conversation, the SPMU, POSHAN Abhiyan, in partnership with The Coalition for Food and Nutrition Security (CFNS) and UNICEF organised a policy dialogue on 19th June 2022 on the theme "Addressing Childhood Wasting in Assam". The recommendations of the consultation were shared with the Chief Secretary, Government of Assam.

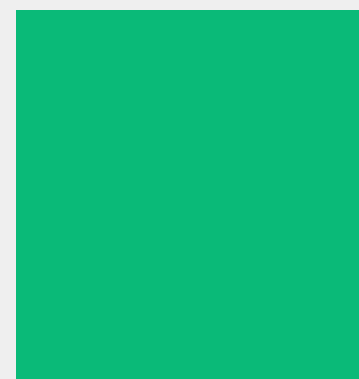
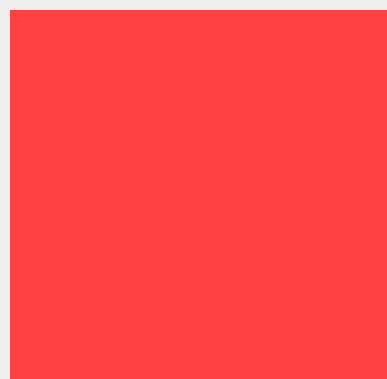




## Madhya Pradesh State Roundtable

The state of Madhya Pradesh has made noteworthy progress in addressing Acute Malnutrition between NFHS-4 (2015-16) and NFHS-5 (2019-21). While the number of children who were underweight has reduced from 43.4% to 33.2% in this period, wasting in children has reduced from 26.3% to 19.3%. Initiatives like the statewide IMAM (Integrated Management of Acute Malnutrition) Program called Mukhyamantri Bal Aarogya Samvardhan Karyakram, the Nutrition Management Strategy 2020, and State Nutrition Policy 2020, have contributed to making Madhya Pradesh one of the first states in India to have a statewide comprehensive Community Based Management of Acute Malnutrition (CMAM) program and guidelines.

The momentum of these significant initiatives taken by the Madhya Pradesh government can be further intensified to accelerate the gains towards achieving a malnutrition-free Madhya Pradesh by 2030. Despite an improvement in the malnutrition status of vulnerable women and children, Madhya Pradesh still lags behind many states of India when seen at a national level. Presently, around one-fifth of the population of children under five in Madhya Pradesh suffer childhood Wasting. A very high prevalence of Anaemia affecting 73% of MP's children poses a serious challenge.



Malnutrition indicators among the tribal children of the state is also high. District level disaggregated data shows that some districts are consistently performing low on various childhood malnutrition indicators and require special initiatives. A State level Roundtable on the theme “Converge to Transform Wasting Landscape in Madhya Pradesh” was organized by CFNS and UNICEF on 18th July, to consolidate the understanding of Convergence in Nutrition space among the development partners working in the geography of Madhya Pradesh. The consultation was attended by International Development Organizations such as Welthungerhilfe, GIZ, Care India, Save the Children, UNFPA, CHAI, representative from CSOs such as Vikas Samvad, Samarthan, Spandan and Individual experts working in the Nutrition space in Madhya Pradesh. The recommendations drawn from the development partners working on field, at the district and state level, provide a pathway for building policies and processes to strengthen the schemes and implementation on ground.

## Jharkhand District Roundtable

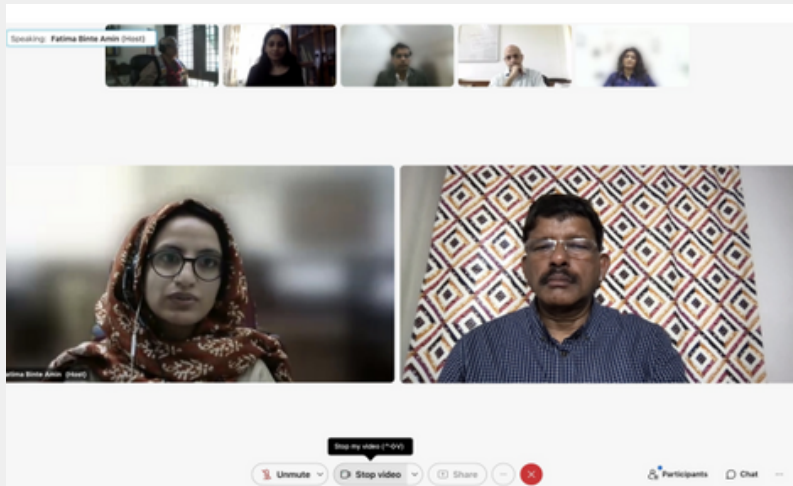
Over the years, Jharkhand has made marginal progress in the reduction of wasting. According to NFHS-4 (2015-16), the percentage of children with wasting was at 29.4% that has marginally reduced to 22.4% according to the recent NFHS-5 (2019-21). Similarly, there is a marginal decrease in severe wasting in under 5 children, from 11.4% to 9.1% between NFHS-4 and NFHS-5. Particularly in Khunti District, the situation of wasting is much higher in comparison to overall Jharkhand and the country. As per NFHS-5, the percentage of children under 5 years who were wasted and severely wasted is 32.1% and 16.8% showing a marginal decrease in comparison to NFHS-4. Strengthening local governance is a key to tackling all forms of malnutrition. Local government institutions such as PRI bodies, community-based institutions such as SHGs and committees of various flagship programs at the village level can play a vital role in strengthening the CMAM program along with various health and nutrition programs at the community level. To accelerate this commitment, The CFNS with the support of the Government of Jharkhand, PHIA Foundation and Welthungerhilfe (WHH) organized a District Consultation in Khunti on 23rd August, 2022 on the theme “Strengthening Local Governance for Addressing Perpetual Childhood Wasting and all forms of Malnutrition in Khunti District”. Recommendations of the District Consultation were shared with the Department of Health and Family Welfare.





# Thematic Webinars

## ‘DRR to Achieve Zero Hunger’



To reflect on the importance of Disaster Risk Reduction strategies especially in the context of hunger and malnutrition CFNS partnered with NIDM and organized a national webinar on ‘DRR to Achieve Zero Hunger’.

The discussions focussed on building resilience through capacity building exercises to deal with the nutritional insecurity and micronutrient deficiency. During the discussion UNICEF emphasised on the need to plan and execute seasonal mitigation strategies to meet the nutritional challenges on Poshan 2.0 as an opportunity to address chronic wasting in India. CIFF stressed on intersectoral convergence for better service delivery to strengthen existing schemes initiated by the Ministry of Women and Child Development with a focus on technological bridge required to collate and analyse information, so that it eases out the operability of data to ICDS.

## ‘DRR to Achieve Zero Hunger’

To highlight the serious issue of nutritional poverty among tribals, The Coalition for Food and Nutrition Security in partnership with Centre for Youth and Social Development, networks and platforms during the Poshan MAAH organised a webinar on the theme “Tribal Nutrition to Supercharge Odisha’s Demographic Dividend.”

The deliberations were on severe wasting trends among tribals in Odisha & the importance of front-line workers at the ground level. In the discussions, it was observed that there is a need to focus on locally producing and ensuring consumption of millets by enhancing productivity with better agronomic practices with continuous engagement with CSR companies & Mission shakti and thereby improving health indicators. The Odisha State Food Commission Chairperson Mr. Pramod Kumar, stressed on the need to disseminate success stories of NRC's & strategies of Odisha Food Commission to overcome malnutrition in Odisha.



## NUTRITION PARLIAMENT: MEETINGS WITH PARLIAMENTARIANS/ POLICY MAKERS



CFNS in partnership with the Government of Jharkhand organised an interactive session on “Addressing Perpetual Childhood Wasting in Jharkhand under the chairpersonship of Shri Arun Kumar Singh, IAS, Development Commissioner, Govt of Jharkhand.

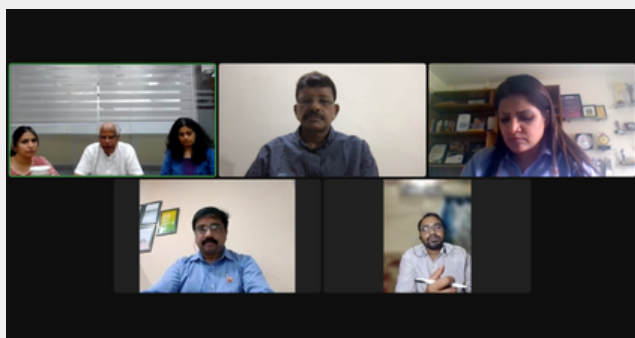
